PHOTOSHOP: Pencil vs Camera

LEARNING TARGETS

- Use Pencil to create a value drawing.
- Combine traditional and non-traditional art media.
- Explore the art of Ben Heine.
- Use Photoshop to composite two images into one.



PROCESS

- 1. **OPEN**: Open Photoshop and choose "File > Open" to open your background photo.
- 2. **CROP**: Select the <u>Crop tool</u> to crop your image:
 - Choose "W x H x Resolution"
 - Enter "<u>8 in</u>" and "<u>10 in</u>" for the height and width (or switch if your photo is portrait orientation) and "<u>300 px/in</u>".
 - Resize/apply the crop on your image, also paying attention to the Rule of Thirds lines.
- 3. LEVELS: Apply the Levels adjustment (Image > Adjustments > Levels...).
- 4. **PRINT**: Print your photo. (see STEP 1 example)
- 5. **DRAFT DRAWING**: Place (tracing) paper over your printed photo and use pencil to <u>lightly</u> sketch your drawing. Make sure to also trace any necessary parts of the background image onto the drawing paper so your drawing will line up correctly. <u>(see STEP 2 example)</u>
- 6. FINAL DRAWING: Next, use pencil to make your final drawing on a new piece of drawing paper. Remember to add a full range of value by using a combination of shading, stippling, hatching and cross-hatching techniques with your pencil. Erase any stray pencil marks. (see STEP 3 example). Carefully tear the edges of the paper, around your drawing.
- 7. **TAKE A PICTURE**: Hold your completed drawing in front of a solid colored wall and take a picture of your hand holding your drawing. Transfer this picture to your computer.
- 8. COMPOSITE: In Photoshop, choose <u>File > Open</u> to open both your background image and the image of your hand holding your drawing. Next, use the <u>Quick Selection</u> or <u>Object Selection tool</u> to select only your hand and drawing, then use the <u>Move tool</u> to move your selection into your background photo. Adjust the placement and size of the drawing to align with the background.
- 9. **SAVE & UPLOAD**: Save your final composition as a Photoshop (PSD) file and save to your flash drive. Also, save as a JPEG image and upload to the "Pencil vs Camera Assignment" on CANVAS.
